NASCO Family of Organizations



North American Students of Cooperation (NASCO)

The North American Students of Cooperation is a non-profit organization dedicated to strengthening and expanding the cooperative movement across the United States and Canada. NASCO was conceived to help educate new generations of co-op members about the principles and practices of cooperation, to forge alliances between existing co-

ops, and to act as an advocate for group equity cooperatives serving students and others. This is accomplished through an array of programs, from training and technical assistance to educational programs to facilitating networking through publications and regional conferences. NASCO's career development program allows co-op members to transfer their skills and energy to internships and jobs in the cooperative business sector. Through its affiliated organizations, NASCO works to expand the co-op movement by assisting groups who want to start new co-ops using the group equity model.

NASCO Properties

NASCO Properties was created in 1988 as a property holding and management corporation to assist new housing cooperatives financing and management. Since then, NASCO Properties has become an important development tool for groups that want to start group equity co-ops but do not have access to sufficient resources. NASCO Properties uses equity from buildings it owns to provide collateral and equity for these new groups. It also operates as a support network for its member co-ops, offering training and asset management assistance. In turn, these member co-ops form the governance structure for NASCO Properties. NP now owns buildings in Austin, Santa Cruz, Buffalo, Urbana, Athens (OH), Davis (CA), and Kalamazoo (new this year!).

NASCO Development Services (formerly Campus Cooperative Development Corporation - CCDC)

Providing technical resources and direct development assistance for new and expanding cooperatives, the Campus Cooperative Development Corporation was started in 1987 to reaffirm our commitment to expansion, and was renamed as NASCO Development Services recently. NASCO DS is funded by its contributing members and through the success fees generated by the co-ops it develops. NASCO DS activities include identifying, fostering, and consulting with co-ops involved in start-up and refinancing. NASCO DS works closely with existing groups, providing technical advice, financial advice, generating loan applications, networking with lending sources and coordinating development efforts to whatever extent is necessary. The success of NASCO DS work has led to our reputation as one of the most aggressive supporters of development in the North American cooperative movement.



Lots In Common

Lots in Common was formed in 2004 as a joint venture between NASCO and Riverton Community Housing, based in Minneapolis. It is designed to be very similar to NASCO Properties, holding title and assisting with operations in various locations around the United States. To begin operations, three buildings leased by Qumbya cooperative in Chicago were transferred from NASCO Properties to Lots in Common.

Kagawa Fund

Named for the Japanese co-op visionary, Toyohiko Kagawa, the Kagawa Fund was established in 1989 as a joint project of NASCO Development Services and the Cooperative Development Foundation (CDF) in Washington. Initially capitalized by a substantial grant from the Japanese Consumer Cooperative Union, the Fund now has over \$400,000 in capital that is used to provide gap financing assistance to fledgling housing co-ops. Structured as a revolving loan fund, Kagawa accepts investments from co-ops and individuals. This year the Kagawa Fund contributed to a number of cooperatives refinancing, and the new construction of Grand House, in Cambridge, Ontario.

President's letter

The Co-operative idea born out of communities around the world and refined by the Rochdale Pioneers well over 150 years ago to address the ills of capitalism as experienced by the workers of the industrial revolution. Over the years co-operatives have evolved and developed co-operative tools to apply to a diverse needs and communities. Co-operation is a third way to carry out business along the Co-operative values and principles. Co-operatives have spread far and wide, to communities around the world, addressing problems through democratic structures evolving over the years to continually meet the needs of their members. So whether it is housing, food, credit, child care, or labor, co-operatives are a tool for us to shape our communities to what we want, and while the struggle continues to develop a co-operative economy having organizations like NASCO is important in helping to support our co-operatives, and foster the creation of new co-operatives.

This year marks an important year for NASCO, as NASCO Family will be meeting to shape the future of NASCO. This important meeting held every 5 years brings together the NASCO Board, NASCO Properties Board, NASCO Development Services Board and the Lots in Common Board along with the NASCO Staff. The gathering will be an important strategic planning meeting as NASCO casts its eyes out to the future planning how the organization

will best support and foster group equity co-operatives in North America and abroad.

Last year's AGM brought forth resolutions that resulted in the NASCO Board expanding the number of seats to better reflect the diversity of the NASCO membership. As well this past year we have also launched a new website which not only provides co-operative tools but also provides a collaborative means for members to share resources and to help maintain the NASCO Guide to Co-operatives.

This year's institute with its theme of "Beyond Capitalism: Co-operative tools for Economic Justice" is important in that it brings co-operators from across North America and around the world, and fosters the sharing of tools to strengthen our co-ops in our communities. Whether you come to the Institute for the first time, or are a seasoned participant, the knowledge and friends that you gain at the Institute will help shape the Co-operative movement and the co-operative economy well in to the future. As well this year's Institute is an important step in the strategic process, and the annual general meeting will be an opportunity for our members to tell us where they feel NASCO should be heading.

Lastly, this year Tom Pierson, Daniel Miller, and Neily Jennings joined the NASCO Staff team, I would like to extend a warm welcome to them as I am sure they will bring renewed enthusiasm to NASCO.



NASCO's Education Programs and Services for 2006-07

NASCO Institute 2006



NASCO's Cooperative Education & Training Institute, which has been providing cooperative training and education annually since 1977, is widely recognized as one of the most important training and networking opportunities available to cooperative members, directors, staff, and managers. 423 people came to the NASCO Institute in early November, attending 78 workshops. The year's

theme was "Our Story: Connecting the Threads of Cooperative Experience."

Member Visits

Staff visited nearly all our members, regardless of size, and were able to visit some more than once. On these visits, staff generally conducted training sessions and consulted on a variety of subjects. Member visits provide an opportunity for NASCO staff to tune-in to issues in cooperatives across North America, and often share experiences seen by other cooperatives in similar situations.

Co-op Staff and Managers Conference



The annual NASCO conference for co-op managers and staff was held in Atlanta, with 15 attendees. There were excellent workshops on a variety of topics, including maintenance and development planning. Many of the conference attendees met with Gloria Tinubu and Howard Johnson, who have assisted NASCO Development Services in starting a housing cooperative in Atlanta.

Networking and Representation

NASCO maintained relations with a number of cooperative organizations in the United States and Canada. Staff attended NCBA and NCB's Annual meetings, in conjunction with the Emerging Coop Leader's program (more below). Other major networking and representation opportunities this year were the U.S. Federation of Worker Cooperatives conference, Twin Oaks Communities Conference, Neighborworks National conference, the annual meeting of the Ontario Student Cooperative Association, the Association of Cooperative Educators annual conference (in Saskatoon, SK), the annual research forum for the

International Cooperative Alliance, and the first U.S. Social Forum. Staff also met with a number of cooperative support organizations in Quebec to strengthen ties with Canada's francophone cooperative movement. Unfortunately NASCO's largest members in Canada decided to not renew membership this year through their provincial coop association, the Ontario Student Cooperative Association. NASCO will continue to serve the cooperative movement in Canada, and will seek to clarify how a mutually beneficial relationship can be built with student coops in Ontario.

Emerging Coop Leaders



Emerging Coop Leaders - 20 registrants from all types of cooperatives attended this year's event, held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the National Cooperative Business Association, in Washington DC. This was NASCO's third year organizing the conference, which was originally started by NCBA to promote cooperative leadership.

Career Development

NASCO again placed a number of interns with both local and national cooperative organizations. The members of NASCO co-operatives are increasingly recognized as knowledgeable and motivated workers who can bring a new level of competence to their efforts.

Anti-Oppression Education Program



The Anti-Oppression Action Camp, held each year in August, provides an intensive training environment for leaders and active members of housing coops, worker collectives, and other democratically run communities. Participants spend one week engaging on privilege and anti-oppression work, using techniques from Theater of the Oppressed.
